Course Number: ENGL 410

Name of Course: Regional Literature

Class Hours: 3

Credit Hours: 3

Catalog Course Description: A study of regional essayists, short story writers, poets, novelists, dramatists, and writers of creative nonfiction in relation to ideological and cultural background, style, and subject matter.

Prerequisites: Grade of C or better in ENGL 101

Course Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Students will identify the distinguishing elements of different genres.

- Describe the concepts and conventions of regional and historical fiction.
- Explain the literary conventions used in the genres of literature by regional writers of fiction, poems, essays, short stories, and novels.
- 2. Students will apply literary terms and definitions appropriately.
 - Define terms pertinent to the specific historical and critical vocabulary in the assigned readings.
- 3. Students will use the technique of close reading in the analysis of literature.
 - Do critical reading of assigned selections.
- 4. Students will demonstrate knowledge of different literary periods, their historical and social backgrounds, individual authors and their creative process, stylistic trends, and/or influence on later authors and literary periods.
 - Recognize major works by regional writers based upon contemporary genres.
 - Relate the historical and ideological significance and turmoil that are evidenced by examples of

literary works from specific regions of the country.

- 5. Students will explore the value, timelessness, universal truths, and/or global nature of literature past and present.
- 6. Students will examine literature through established theories and/or critical frameworks and interdisciplinary lenses where appropriate.
 - Evaluate the merits and significance of individual works.
- 7. Students will write coherently about literature, providing information from the text(s) to support their reasoning.
 - Provide relevant and insightful interpretations of specific literary works of the region studied.

CLO Assessment Methods: Instructors will choose from assignments that will include a combination of writing, tests, presentations, and class participation.

Topics to be studied:

- Various selections of essays, poems, short stories, novels, creative nonfiction, and dramatic works from a particular region or territory of the United States.
- Students may be assigned to present short, oral reports on individual authors, supplemental texts, or historical background sources related to the assigned readings and course overview.
- Instructors may select any of the four regions of the country to base readings and authors.
